BFI Southbank presents work from the latter part of his career; from the groundbreaking **Victim** (1961) - celebrating its 50th anniversary - and **The Servant** (1963) to **Darling** (1965) and **Accident** (1967). Hollywood lost a legend and the world mourned when Britain's best loved screen goddess died this spring. Across BFI Southbank:

Highlights of the August programme at BFI Southbank include the first part of a season dedicated to films starring **Dirk Bogarde** during the latter part of his career. **Basil Dearden's Victim** (1961) was a landmark in film history for its portrayal of homosexuality and the impact it made on British legislative reform. **Joseph Losey's The Servant** (1963) was the first title to bring him acclaim from Europe, and he would work with Losey again on **Modesty Blaise** (1966) and **Accident** (1967). **Arena: The Private Dirk Bogarde** (BBC, 2001) provides a personal portrait of the actor, from interviews with family and friends to home movies shot by his companion of 40 years. This tribute season complements the publication of BFI Film Classics on *Victim* (by John Goldstream) and *The Servant* (by Amy Sergeant).

When **Dame Elizabeth Taylor** died last April it was widely acknowledged that with her passed a star of such enormity that would never be seen again. She was the last from a golden age of Hollywood and a selection of her finest and most challenging films supports this; from **Father of the Bride** (1950) and **Cat on a Hot Tin Roof** (1958) to those she starred in with **Richard Burton - Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?** (1966), which was nominated for 13 Oscars, and **Boom!** (1968).

The **Art Theatre Guild of Japan** supported the most vibrant waves in postwar world cinema and became the home for filmmakers seeking independence. At a time when Japan's film industry was experiencing considerable shifts in its development, the ATG became an alternative to the established film culture. A meeting point for a network of artistic voices, ATG began to pull together outcast luminaries of studio filmmaking, documentary, experimental and TV filmmaking and allowed them to run wild, the result was a concentrated period of vibrant innovation in independent cinema, a creative peak in the late 1960s and early 1970s that is represented in this 12-film season curated by film historians **Roland Domenig** and **Hirasawa Go**.

He leads a seemingly idyllic life with her by the sea - where the scenic beauties and delights of LSD are fully revealed by Nestor Almendros' stunning photography - before succumbing to the destructive trappings of heroin addiction. The film is famous for its subdued, moody Pink Floyd soundtrack, featuring some of the band's most spontaneous and eclectic work.

Using interviews, archival footage and reconstructed scenes, James Marsh creates an epic drama about the unsettling life of tragic hero Nim Chimpsky in this documentary biopic. Detailing the chimpanzee Nim's life, from being placed as a baby within a human family by Columbia professor Herbert Terrace to learn sign language and display proof of cross-species conversation, to the many organisations and labs that he lived in as an adult. Compelling viewing.

Germany-India 1925. Dir Franz Osten & Himansu Rai. With Seeta Devi, Rani Bala. c97min.

This spectacular and rarely shown epic will screen with a new live score from Pandit Vishwa Prakash and his team of musicians. It follows the story of Prince Siddhartha, who rejects his privileged position to search for Truth and becomes Buddha, or the Enlightened One. Shot on location in Lahore with the co-operation of the Maharajah of Jaipur, it involves a cast of thousands, and is shown as a highlight of the South Asian Cinema Foundation's flagship programme of events, supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund. Hungary 1965. Dir Miklós Jancsó. With János Görbe, Zoltán Latinovits, Tibor Molnár. 90min. EST. PG
Set after the crushing of the 1848 revolution in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, *The Round-Up* follows the brutal repression of the last revolutionary fighters. Jancsó's film is a timeless account of the relationship between power and subjugation, filled with unforgettable images. A masterpiece of Eastern European cinema.

An aristocratic mother, Tamaki, and her two children are separated from her husband when he disobeys a feudal lord. The children are kidnapped and sold into slavery. Mizoguchi's re-telling of this Japanese legend is one of his best-loved films. A carnival sharpshooter played by Peggy Cummins and her pistol-fixated partner John Dall sublimate their sexual energies into an obsession with gunplay, embarking on a doomed crime spree throughout the Midwest. With a taut script by Mackinlay Kantor and blacklisted writer Dalton Trumbo, and Lewis's spare, elegant direction – one bank robbery sequence was shot entirely in one long take – *Gun Crazy* is a masterclass in style on a low budget + **The Hill Farm** (1988, Mark Baker, 18min)

Les Demoiselles de Rochefort takes place in the seaside town over the period of a weekend. A carnival arrives, and twin sisters (played by real-life siblings Deneuve and Dorléac) long for love outside the confines of their small town. Suffused with a sparkling score by Michel Legrand, *Les Demoiselles* is Demy's tribute to the American musical and a joyous fusion of colour, dance and music.

The Fluxus movement emerged in New York in the 60s, moving to Europe, and eventually to Japan. The movement encompassed a new aesthetic encompassing Dada, Bauhaus and Zen, fusing and combining a range of media. The Fluxfilms embodied the minimal aesthetic and playfulness of Fluxus and transposed its performative aspect into the cinema. This screening will present a selection of films made between 1963 and 1970, regrouped in the Fluxfilm Anthology. The programme includes

Preceding *Saturday Night and Sunday Morning* by three years, this groundbreaking film was the first 'kitchen sink' drama, adapted by Ted Willis from his own TV play. It tells the story of a middle-aged woman who is shocked to discover that her seemingly happily married husband has become infatuated with a younger woman. Producer Frank Godwin will introduce the screening and discuss the film's original impact.

USA 1991. Dir Charles Burnett. 101min

Both written and directed by Burnett, this domestic drama is a powerful masterpiece. Danny Glover stars as Harry, an enigmatic and devilish drifter from the South, who visits an old friend in LA. Despite his charming manner he has a strange and powerful influence on his middle-class host and family. Screening as a complement to African Remembrance Day, its resonant storytelling raises questions about the abandonment of community and culture and the importance of connecting the past to the present. Film historian Jim Pines will introduce and discuss the film.

USA 2010. Dir Lisa Cholodenko. With Annette Bening, Julianne Moore, Mark Ruffalo. 106min. 15

The kids may be all right, it's the adults who have problems in Cholodenko's slick, Oscar-nominated film. When Nic and Jules' teenage children, conceived using an anonymous donor's sperm, choose to find their biological father, they don't envisage the potential threat posed to their mothers' relationship.

Japan 1969. Dir Matsumoto Toshio. With Pita, Ogasawara Osamu. 107min. EST

Counterculture finds its home in Matsumoto's creative subversion of Sophocles' *Oedipus*, filtered through Shinjuku's underworld. Transsexual Eddie's forgotten fragments of her past gradually surface to reveal what might have been best left unveiled. Matsumoto throws an array of stylistic gestures into his concoction of moving-image experiments in the film that has become Japan's representative queer cinema title. Projecting the Archive: The Scapegoat

UK 1958. Dir Robert Hamer. With Alec Guinness, Bette Davis, Pamela Brown. 91min. PG
Daphne du Maurier's source novel, here adapted by Gore Vidal, gives Guinness another chance to play dual roles: a quiet, unremarkable lecturer holidaying in France and his double, an impoverished and dissolute French aristocrat. The lecturer becomes the lecher in a complicated plot which winds to an unexpected ending. Brusquely dismissed by du Maurier herself, and roughly abridged by MGM, the film nonetheless has a sophisticated charm and Guinness has a fine time in both roles.

Wings of the Morning

UK 1937. Dir Harold Schuster. With Annabella, Henry Fonda, Leslie Banks, Irene Vanbrugh. 86min
Britain's first Technicolor feature, here seen in the BFI's 1988 restoration, is a romance set in Ireland, Spain and on the Epsom Downs. Impetuous gypsy girl Maria (Annabella) dresses as a boy to escape war in Spain, and meets Kerry (Fonda) a young horse trainer. After predictable misunderstandings, love triumphs on a climactic Derby day. With Jack Cardiff as camera operator, it's the cinematography that stays in the mind, from lush countryside to dazzling shots of London.

Capital Tales: This Happy Breed

UK 1944. Dir David Lean. With Celia Johnson, Robert Newton, John Mills, Kay Walsh. 111min. PG
Book-ended by panoramic shots of South London accompanied by Noël Coward's 'London Pride' on the soundtrack, *This Happy Breed* can be read as a paean to plucky Londoners, though it also works as a eulogy to the 'national' character. Adapted from Coward's play, the film is a warm and uplifting depiction of a typical lower middle-class family between the wars, which, while set and partly filmed in Clapham, manages to transcend its locale, capturing with moving sincerity the fortitude and good humour of ordinary British people. + **Paddle your Own Canoe** (UK 1922, 1min): Kids enjoy aquatic fun on Clapham Common.

The Flipside: French Dressing

UK 1963. Dir Ken Russell. 86min. PG
This rarely screened, gently anarchic first feature by the legendary Ken Russell is tremendous fun. Not much happens in the sleepy seaside town of Gormleigh-on-Sea, so modish deckchair attendant Jim (James Booth) decides to stage a Cannes-style film festival with friends Henry (Roy Kinnear) and Judy (Alita Naughton). The town's uptight mayor is resistant – until he sees sexy, Bardot-like actress Françoise Fayol (Marisa Mell), who flounces over from France to open the shindig in truly continental style. Can these amateurs pull it off?

unLOCKed – The Library of Congress Discoveries: Rembrandt

BBC 1969. Dir Rudolph Cartier. With Richard Johnson, Jill Bennett. 90min
Based on Carl Zuckmayer's 'film-play' (as was the 1936 Korda big-screen version) this was another *tour de force* for Cartier. Taking place between the years 1642 and 1699, this tells the story of how the great artist lost his wife, had his greatest painting rejected, fell into terrible debt and eventually found a new love. A copy aired in the US in 1971 as part of NET Playhouse, and it is that version which survived in the LOC archives and is screened here. Originally made in colour, sadly it only survives in black-and-white but, of course, that doesn't detract from the fine performances and ingenious execution.

The Strange World of Gurney Slade

ITV 1960. Dir Anthony Newley. With Anthony Newley. 2x30mins + extracts + discussion

Finally, 50 years after its original transmission, one of the great lost comedies of British television is to get a full DVD release. *The Strange World of Gurney Slade* was a groundbreaking surreal comedy that baffled the public but was almost universally praised by the critics of the time. One episode surfaced in the 1990s as part of C4's *TV Heaven* strand and a further episode screened at BFI Southbank a couple of years ago as part of the *Flipside's* Anthony Newley special, but otherwise the series has remained unseen since its repeat run in 1963. After the *TV Heaven* screening *Gurney Slade* was described as a cross between *Monty Python* and *The Prisoner*, but of course it predated both series by some years. We will screen two episodes, supported by related material – not all of which will be available on the forthcoming DVD release. Screening courtesy of Network Video.

Oliver & Company

USA 1988. Dir George Scribner. With voices of Billy Joel, Bette Midler, Cheech Marin. 74min. U
Disney's re-imagining of *Oliver Twist* – with Oliver, a cat, and Dodger, a dog – has been overlooked by many because of the classic titles that directly followed it, but there's plenty to enjoy here as we travel to New York. *Oliver & Company* marks the start of lyricist Howard Ashman's relationship with Disney, shortly before he teamed with Alan Menken on the score for *The Little Mermaid*. + *Puss-Cafe* (1950, 7min).

The Little Mermaid

USA 1989. Dir John Clements & Ron Musker. With voices of Jodi Benson, Pat Carroll. 83min. U
The story of mermaid Ariel's huge sacrifice to be with the man she loves marks a massive turning point in the fortunes of Disney's animated output at this time. With the winning combination of a classic fairytale, breathtaking animation and a great score, the 28th film in 'The Disney 50' took over three times as much as its predecessor at the box office, not to mention the merchandising and other spin-offs. + *The Simple Things* (1953, 7min).

The Rescuers Down Under

USA 1990. Dir Hendel Butoy & Mike Gabriel. With voices of Eva Gabor, Bob Newhart 77min. U
A rare cinematic sequel for Disney. We find ourselves in the company of mice Bernard and Bianca, agents from the Rescue Aid Society, who fly to Australia to search for Cody, a kidnapped boy, and Marahute, a golden eagle threatened by poachers. Orville the albatross is indisposed, so his brother Wilbur provides the transport overseas. This is the first traditionally animated Disney feature to use computer assistance in the form of CAPS (Computer Animation Production System) and has a number of CGI touches throughout the film. Plus *Mickey Down Under* (1948, 7min).

Beauty and the Beast

USA 1991. Dir Gary Trousdale & Kirk Wise. With voices of Angela Lansbury, Paige O'Hara 84min. U
Belle is sent to live with a reclusive beast, little knowing the secret of his entire household, who are all the victims of a terrible spell. As they become closer, her father sets about trying to gather a mob together to break down the castle doors, attack the beast and rescue his daughter. The seamless blend of traditional and CGI animation, especially in the classic ballroom scene, set a new benchmark in what animation could achieve and *Beauty and the Beast* became the first full-length animated feature to be nominated for the Best Picture Oscar. Plus *The Clock Store* (1931, 7min).
