# John Boorman, Made in Britain: Warp Films at 10, Pier Paolo Pasolini, Streetwise Opera, BEV

- On 25 March John Boorman will be awarded a BFI Fellowship. To mark the
  occasion he will be interviewed by Michel Ciment on-stage at BFI Southbank to
  launch a major retrospective of his work, accompanied by an exhibition of artefacts
  from Boorman's personal archive, plus the Extended Run of *Point Blank*
- Made in Britain returns this year with a focus on Warp Films at 10, launching with an exclusive screening of Dead Man's Shows accompanied by a live score, featuring a BUG special and titles such as *Four Lions*, *Kill List* and *Submarine*
- The Pier Paolo Pasolini retrospective the most comprehensive ever to be held in the UK – will conclude with a re-release of *Theorem* alongside titles such as *Medea*, starring Maria Callas, *Canterbury Tales* and the infamous *Salò or the 120 Days of* Sodom
- Vengeance, violence and sexuality are central to Jacobean tragedy and key plays, made for TV, will illustrate this, featuring *The Duchess of Malfi, 'Tis a Pity She's a Whore* and *Women Beware Women* followed by a panel & Q&A with Diana Rigg
- Bird's Eye View Film Festival will return to BFI Southbank with a celebration of Arab Women Filmmakers, bringing a range of premieres and Ernst Lubitsch's *One Arabian Night* with a live score by Amira Khier
- The Servant is re-released in a new print to mark the 60th anniversary of the landmark film, while the 1973 Cannes Palme d'or-winner Scarecrow will screen as an Extended Run in a new print
- Streetwise the Opera World Premiere: The Answer to Everything is the 10th Anniversary production by the lauded charity that brings together Streetwise's homeless and ex-homeless performers in this interactive film and live opera
- This month's preview events include *In The House*, by Francois Ozon, *The Look of* Love, by Michael Winterbottom and starring Steve Coogan, *The Place Beyond the Pines*, starring Ryan Gosling, LFF hit *The Reluctant Fundamentalist* and *Trance*, introduced by the film's director Danny Boyle

#### **SEASONS:**

#### • John Boorman

On 25 March **John Boorman** will be presented a **BFI Fellowship** – the highest accolade that the nation's leading organisation for film can award. To mark the occasion he will be interviewed by **Michel Ciment**, on-stage at **BFI Southbank**, to launch a major retrospective of his work and to celebrate his recent 80th birthday. There will also be an Extended Run and nationwide release of **Point Blank** (1967) and an exclusive exhibition of artefacts from Boorman's personal archive, on display in the Mezzanine – including a dress worn by **Helen Mirren** in **Excalibur** (1981). To complement this season there will be an exclusive run of **Me and Me Dad** (2011), an intimate insight of life in the Boorman family, directed by John's daughter **Katrine Boorman** (who will appear in conversation on 27 March).

According to Philip French, John Boorman is 'one of the greatest filmmakers this country has produced'. He began his career as a documentary director for the BBC with *Citizen 63* (BBC, 1963) and *The Newcomers* (BBC, 1964), and this season will feature these early works and follow his varied filmmaking career to date. From *Catch Us If You Can* (1965), a showcase of the **Dave Clark Five**, and his first features made in the US such as *Hell in the Pacific* (1968) and *Deliverance* (1972), through fantasies *Zardoz* (1973) and *Excalibur*, to titles with a more political agenda that include *Beyond Rangoon* (1995) and *Country of My Skull* (aka *In My Country*, 2004). *The General* (1998) won Boorman the prize for **Best Director** at **Cannes** that year and was his first film to depict contemporary Ireland, starring **Brendan Gleason** as Dublin folk hero and criminal Martin Cahill. With a new project in development now is the perfect time to reflect on the amazing and diverse career of one of the UK's most daring directors.

• Extended Run: Point Blank (Dir John Boorman, 1967) 29 Mar – Thu 11 April NEW PRINT Boorman's American debut remains a landmark crime film, mixing fast-paced, hard-hitting Hollywood action with European stylistic experimentation to intoxicating effect. Lee Marvin is cast to career-best perfection as Walker, an old-school gangster left to die in Alcatraz after an otherwise successful heist. Like an avenging angel, he returns to seek out those who betrayed him and retrieve his share of the loot from the outwardly respectable, strangely faceless 'Organisation'. Bringing a sharp outsider's eye – and Philip Lathrop's superb 'Scope compositions – to the strikingly angular cityscapes of Los Angeles and San Francisco, Boorman also deployed a teasingly fragmented chronology, innovative sound design and careful colour schemes to create a consistently surprising, acerbically witty and gripping narrative. Though there have been subsequent adaptations of Donald Westlake's The Hunter, this terse masterpiece remains by far the best and still feels exhilaratingly modern.

#### • Pier Paolo Pasolini, Part Two

BFI Southbank, together with Luce Cinecittà and Cineteca di Bologna, will conclude the retrospective of films by **Pier Paolo Pasolini**, who remains one of the most formidable directors in European cinema. Pasolini (1922-1975) was a director, novelist, poet, linguist, painter and journalist with an outspoken political agenda, and this second chapter of the season sees his 'Cinema of Poetry' grew more colourful both literally, when he began shooting in colour, and contextually. He brought to life retellings of European myths, such as *Oedipus Rex* (*Edipo Re*, 1967) and *Medea* (1968), starring **Maria Callas**, and launched his project to create modern 'myths' of his own to analyse modern and bourgeois social ills. In *Theorem* (*Teorema*, 1968), also to be released in a new print and screen in an **Extended Run**, **Terence Stamp** plays a mysterious figure who enters the house of a middle-class, Milanese family and seduces each of them before abandoning them. Pasolini also turned to storytelling from the Middle Ages – Boccaccio's **Decameron** (*Il Decameron*, 1971), Chaucer's **Canterbury Tales** (*I racconti di Canterbury*, 1972) and the multi-authored **Arabian Nights** (*Il fiore delle Mille e Una* 

Notte, 1974). Just before his mysterious and brutal murder, he turned his focus to the cruel fantasies of De Sade in Salò or the 120 Days of Sodom (Salò, o le 120 giornate di Sodoma, 1975) the ultimate negation of humanity, set to Mussolini's dream of a fascist republic.

Many of these celebrated films will be shown in recently restored versions, and all are presented in newly struck prints, realised by Luce Cinecittà (unless otherwise noted).

#### • Extended Run: Theorem (Teorema, 1968) 12 - 30 April NEW PRINT

Nobody had ever seen a film like *Theorem* when it arrived on European screens in 1968, and its huge success took Pasolini's cultural standing to a new level. Terence plays a mysterious visitor to an upper-middleclass family in Milan. What if, Pasolini asks, each member of the household - father, mother, son and daughter, not forgetting the maid - were to be seduced and then abandoned by the visitor? How would each of them react, and what would become of their lives? The title suggests something quasi-scientific, but the fuel in Pasolini's tank is satire, not algebra. Existential anguish was never more playful.

# • Made in Britain: Warp Films at 10

In spring last year BFI Southbank launched Made in Britain, an annual exploration of contemporary British Cinema. In April the strand returns with a selection of the most groundbreaking titles from Warp Films, as we celebrate this seminal production company's 10th anniversary. Warp Films have in their way defined a decade and are helping to shape the future of British cinema, offering the opportunity for highly original and exciting talent to make films that might otherwise be overlooked. BAFTA-winning films such as the This is **England** (2006), **Four Lions** (2010) and **Tyrannosaur** (2011) will all feature, but the season will launch with what promises to be a truly awesome event when **Dead Man's Shoes** (2004), directed by **Shane Meadows**, will screen with a live music accompaniment - featuring musicians from UNKLE and Clayhill plus Jah Wobble - at the Queen Elizabeth Hall on Friday 29 March. There will also be a Warp Films Shorts Programme, including work by Lynne Ramsay, Chris Cunningham and Paddy Considine plus a BUG: Warp Records Special, followed by an aftershow in benugo with Warp DJs hitting the decks. To complement this amazing showcase there will be an exhibition of newly designed Warp Film posters, by Sheffield-based artist Pete McKee, displayed exclusively in The Atrium at BFI Southbank.

# Jacobean Tragedy on TV

Vengeance, murder and sin are most certainly among the core themes of the 'tragedies of blood' written in the early 17th century, alongside madness, scenes of carnage and human sexuality. While British television has sustained a strong - and largely reverential relationship with the plays of William Shakespeare, the dark and psychologically complex dramas written by John Ford, John Webster and others in the decades just after the Bard's pre-eminence have enjoyed far fewer adaptations. This programme will launch with a screening of Thomas Middleton's tale of illicit desire Woman Beware Woman (Granada, 1965), followed by a panel featuring Dame Diana Rigg. Though these plays may set contemporary actors huge challenges, they also continue to offer the potential for great performances, as is demonstrated by Eileen Atkins in James MacTaggart's adaptation of The Duchess of Malfi (BBC, 1972), Tim Piggott-Smith and Cheri Lunghi in Roland Joffe's "Tis

**Pity She's a Whore** (BBC 1980) and **Elizabeth McGovern** and **Bob Hoskins in** Simon Curtis' version of **The Changeling** (BBC, 1993). With a fine selection of TV plays from the last five decades it is clear that these tragedies retain a powerful relevance and appeal. UNIVERSITY OF WESTMINSTER™

# • Bird's Eye View Film Festival: Celebrating Women Filmmakers

Once again Birds Eye View returns to BFI Southbank, this year highlighting the extraordinary new work by female Arab directors making headlines at the world's leading film festivals. Between the Opening Night Gala *When I Saw You Lamma Shoftak* (*Lamma* Shoftak, 2012), followed by a Q&A, and Closing Night Awards Gala featuring *Habibi* (*Habibi Rasak Kharban*, 2011) will be an impressive number of premieres, director interviews and events. The silent classic *One Arabian Night* (*Sumrun*, 1920), by **Ernst Lubitsch**, will screen to a live score by **Amira Khier** – especially commissioned for BEV.













• Extended Run: The Servant (Dir Joseph Losey, 1963) Fri 26 - Tue 30 Apr NEW PRINT

The first of three acclaimed collaborations between director Joseph Losey and writer Harold Pinter, this memorably mordant study of class, sex, conspiracy and corruption was a landmark in the development of British cinema. When Hugo Barrett (Dirk Bogarde) is taken on as 'gentleman's gentleman' in the Chelsea home of indolent aristocrat Tony (James Fox), all seems to go well until Barrett persuades Tony to hire his sister Vera (Sarah Miles) as a live-in maid, and matters take another turn for the worse... Skilfully adapting a post-war novella by Robin Maugham, Pinter and Losey created one of the definitive depictions of the English class system in all its fading, decadent glory, observing the shifts in power between moneyed master and scheming servant. Bogarde's performance in particular is so strong that it transformed his career.

• Extended Run: Scarecrow (Dir Jerry Schatzberg, 1973) Fri 26 – Tue 30 Apr NEW PRINT With bravura performances from Al Pacino and Gene Hackman, this 1973 Cannes Palme d'orwinner is now restored and ripe for rediscovery. Pacino plays Francis Lionel Delbuchi, a sailor nicknamed 'Lion' by Max (Hackman), the volatile ex-con he falls in with while hitching a ride in California. After six years in San Quentin, Max plans to visit his sister in Denver before heading to Pittsburgh to start up a carwash business – with Lion as his partner; the latter, however, insists on a detour to Detroit to see a young son born soon after he went to sea. Schatzberg's tale of their often funny but troubled journey is an unusually fruitful variation on the buddy-movie. Both the stars and the supporting cast contribute to an uncommonly credible portrait of lower-working-class American life that is witty, raw, truthful and compassionate in its account of dependence and responsibility.

# Peter Kubelka presents Monument Film

Austria 2012. Dir Peter Kubelka. Lecture Screening. c90min

The Austrian filmmaker Peter Kubelka has been a vital and uncompromising force in cinema for more than half a century. In a body of work that lasts not much more than an hour in total, he condenses and articulates the essential qualities of analogue cinema, distinguishing film as an autonomous artform. His 1960 film Arnulf Rainer, composed only of the purest elements of light and darkness, sound and silence, remains one of the most radical achievements in film history. In response to that earlier work, his new film Antiphon was revealed in 2012 as part of Monument Film, a powerful testament to the entire medium. With two 35mm projectors situated in the auditorium, each film is screened individually, then combined as double projections, both side-by-side and superimposed upon each other. Throughout this extraordinary projection event, Peter Kubelka will discuss his theories, explaining the differences between film and digital media, and articulating his belief in the survival of cinema.

#### Projecting the Archive: The Day They Robbed the Bank of England

UK 1959. Dir John Guillermin. With Aldo Ray, Peter O'Toole, Elizabeth Sellars, Miles Malleson. 85min. **U** 'They' are the IRA, coyly referred to as 'The Movement', who plan to rob the Bank of England vaults to boost their coffers – and inflict humiliation on the British government. Aldo Ray stars as the meaty Irish-American mining engineer brought in to mastermind the heist (and boost the US box office). In his first major role, Peter O'Toole stars as the initially languid Guards officer who stumbles across the plot and finally proves his mettle as a soldier. It was this performance which led David Lean to cast him as Lawrence. Inevitably there's a romantic subplot, but the pleasure of the film resides more in the physical detail of the frenzied tunnelling beneath the Bank and the gallery of familiar characters in small roles, including the inimitable Miles Malleson as the Assistant Curator of the Soane Museum.

Senegal 1975 Dir Ousmane Sembene. With Thierno Lieye, Myriam Niang, Seune Samb 120min EST 12A Starting as a novelist, Ousmane Sembene turned to cinema in order to reach a wider, non-elite audience. Xala (adapted from his own novel) is a critical, satiric look at the power structure in Africa, through the story of an official in a newly-installed ruling elite who becomes impotent; a condition that afflicts him with his new wife (who is younger than his daughter). Sembene's caustic satire on corrupt and ineffective governance links the state's unequal gender politics with the wider failings of the new ruling class.

Its female protagonist Gaby Doriot (played by Italian actress Isa Miranda) is a film star and femme fatale who, under anaesthetic, looks back at her destructive past and the lives she has ruined. Unashamedly romantic, Ophuls' richly observed study of the beautiful and glacial Gaby is marked by the gliding camerawork that would become the signature of his later work.

Corky, a surprisingly convincing Gershon in the sexy butch role, tries to resist Violet's attentions at first, but it's not long before she succumbs and then the two really are in trouble as they try to outsmart some very violent mobsters.

A fine profile of Miriam Makeba, world famous singer and international campaigner against Apartheid. Interviews and archive clips contribute to a portrait of Makeba, who appeared in Lionel Rogosin's feted 1959 documentary Come Back, Africa. Exile in the USA followed this exposure, and she there became a protégée of Harry Belafonte, pleading in the United Nations for sanctions. Makeba's marriage to Black Panther Stokely Carmichael then resulted in rejection by the US music business. The film culminates with her triumphant return to South Africa at the behest of Nelson Mandela.
