This September **BFI Southbank** celebrate living legend **STEPHEN KING**, one of the most frequently adapted and versatile writers in history, and as formidable a cinematic force as a literary one. **STEPHEN KING ON SCREEN** will coincide with the author's 70th birthday on 21 September, the release of a new novel *Sleeping Beauties* (co-written with son Owen) on September 26, as well as new adaptations including *It* (Andres Muschietti, 2017), which will be previewed in the season. As well as screenings of classic film and TV adaptations, there will also be talks and discussions, a special **Birthday Weekender** (21-23 September) and a sidebar of some of King's favourite films, chosen specially by the author to screen at BFI Southbank. Continuing in September will be VISIONS OF THE UNDERWORLD, the BFI's season dedicated to French director **Jean-Pierre Melville**, as well as **BFI INDIA ON FILM**, which this month focuses on the work of documentary filmmaker **Sanjay Kak**, who will appear in conversation on **Sunday 17 September**. BFI Southbank's television season during September will be dedicated to five legends of jazz who all celebrate their centenary this year. **A TON OF JAZZ** will showcase British TV appearances of renowned performers **Ella Fitzgerald**, '**Dizzy' Gillespie**, **Thelonious Monk**, **Lena Horne** and **Buddy Rich**.

Highlights of the events programme will be a special **30**th **anniversary screening of** *Withnail and I* (Bruce Robinson, 1987), followed by a **Q&A with star Richard E Grant**, a **BFI DVD launch** of Mike Leigh's *Life is Sweet* (1990) (out on BFI Blu-ray and DVD on Monday 18 September), followed by a **Q&A with actors Alison Steadman and Jane Horrocks and director Mike Leigh**, and a **BFI Member Exclusive** in which **Dame Joan Collins** introduces her *BFI Screen Epiphany* – *The Fabulous Baker Boys* (Steve Kloves, 1989). Films previews this month will include Ildikó Enyedi's *On Body and Soul* (2017) followed by a **Q&A with the director**, which was the winner of the Golden Bear at this year's Berlin Film Festival, and a **4K restoration preview** of Joel and Ethan Coen's *Blood Simple* (1984). **TV previews** will include the latest adaptation of one of **David Walliams'** hugely popular novels *Ratburger* (Sky One, King Bert, 2017), followed by a **Q&A with Walliams**, and *Liar* (ITV, Two Brothers Pictures, 2017), the newest drama from brothers Harry and Jack Williams, who co-wrote *The Missing* and exec-produced *Fleabag*.

There will also be the UK Premiere of *Listen to Britain 2017*, a compelling collection of 12 short films commissioned by BBC Four and BFI NETWORK, in association with Wingspan Productions to celebrate the 75th anniversary of *Listen To Britain*, Humphrey Jennings and Stewart McAllister's poetic collage of British life. There will be extended runs of BFI-backed *God's Own Country* (Francis Lee, 2017), which won Best British Feature at this year's Edinburgh International Film Festival; Bertrand Tavernier's fascinating voyage through French film history, *My Journey Through French Cinema* (2016); Buñuel's subversive comedy-drama of bourgeois manners *Belle de jour* (1967), and a **new and exclusive 70mm print** of David Lean's *Lawrence of Arabia* (1962).

Running from Friday 1 September – Tuesday 3 October, STEPHEN KING ON SCREEN will be a season of film and television dedicated to living legend STEPHEN KING, one of the most frequently adapted and versatile writers in history, and as formidable a cinematic force as a literary one. As 2017 sees an exciting new crop of adaptations including *It* (Andres Muschietti, 2017) - which will preview in the season - and *The Dark Tower* (Nikolaj Arcel, 2017), as well as King's 70th birthday on 21 September and the release of a new novel *Sleeping Beauties* (co-written with son Owen) on September 26, there's no better time to celebrate and re-evaluate his invaluable contribution to the moving image. The season will include screenings of classic adaptations such as *Stand by Me* (Rob Reiner, 1986) and *The Shawshank Redemption* (Frank Darabont, 1994), talks and discussions, selected screenings of films including *Carrie* (Brian De Palma, 1976) and *The Shining* (Stanley Kubrick, 1980) on the huge screen at the BFI IMAX, and a special Birthday Weekender (21-23 September) including a Stephen King Film Quiz and a Stephen King Summit. Alongside the season Stephen King has chosen a selection of his favourite films to screen exclusively at BFI Southbank. These include *Night of the Demon* (Jacques Tourneur, 1957), *Village of the Damned* (Wolf Rilla, 1960) and *The Stepfather* (Joseph Ruben, 1987).

JEAN-PIERRE MELVILLE: VISIONS OF THE UNDERWORLD – PART TWO

Beginning in August, BFI Southbank's **VISIONS OF THE UNDERWORLD**, will be a comprehensive two month season dedicated to the versatile and artistically ambitious French filmmaker **Jean-Pierre Melville** (1917-1973), in this, his centenary year. The season includes a re-release of *Le doulos* (1962), Melville's dazzlingly intricate tale of deadly suspicion and betrayal starring Jean-Paul Belmondo and Serge Reggiani. Back in cinemas courtesy of Park Circus on **Friday 11 August**, *Le doulos* screens in part one of the season in August. With the sole exception of Melville's profoundly personal adaptation of Joseph Kessel's celebrated novel about the French Resistance, *L'Armée des ombres* (1969), from *Le Doulos* onwards, Melville worked exclusively in the crime genre. Part two of the season, from **Friday 1 September – Tuesday 3 October**, will focus on this latter period of his career.

The mood and visual style of Melville's thrillers were consistently influenced by American noir; thematically, the films returned repeatedly to questions of trust and codes, honour, shame and guilt. Very loosely adapted from a Georges Simenon novel, *L'Ainé des ferchaux* (1963) chronicles the geographical and emotional odyssey undertaken by an elderly embezzler and the young boxer he hires as his assistant when he flees with his fortune to America. *Le Deuxième soufflé* (1966) is arguably Melville's greatest film, with Lino Ventura utterly superb as an escaped con hiding from the cops and plotting one last robbery before he leaves France. With its cold, bluesy colours, its many wordless scenes, its pared-back, ritual-filled narrative and an opening scene which pays tribute to the film of Graham Greene's *This Gun for Hire*, *Le Samouraï* (1967) is Melville's most mythic take on the world of crime.

Inspired in part by the various robbery set-ups in John Huston's *The Asphalt Jungle*, *Le Cercle rouge* (1970) is a heist movie which centres on the preparation, execution and aftermath of a lengthy, daring and meticulously planned jewel-robbery in the Place Vendôme. Completing the season is *Un Flic* (1972) starring Alain Delon and Catherine Deneuve; Melville's final film returned to the near-abstract style of *Le Samouraï*, with a protracted opening bank robbery in torrential rain brilliantly establishing the murky mood. The tortuous plot involving drugs, informers and a further robbery even allows for the investigating cop (played by Delon) to be the gangleader's friend, taking Melville's abiding interest in the cat-and-mouse relationship between criminals and police to its logical conclusion. *VISIONS OF THE UNDERWORLD* offers audiences an opportunity to discover the work of a truly original and proudly independent filmmaker, admired by contemporary directors such as Jim Jarmusch and Quentin Tarantino as well as by key names of the French New Wave, to such an extent that he even had a bit part in Godard's seminal *Breathless* (1960).

A TON OF JAZZ: AMERICA'S COOLEST GENERATION ON BRITISH TV

2017 sees the centenary of five jazz greats, all of whom made memorable appearances on British television; to celebrate, BFI Southbank will host **A TON OF JAZZ: AMERICA'S COOLEST GENERATION ON BRITISH TV** from **Saturday 9 September – Tuesday 3 October.** The BFI's Dick Fiddy has combed the TV archives to unearth great performances by, interviews with, and commentaries about a unique quintet: 'First Lady of Song' **Ella Fitzgerald**; Bebop champion and trumpeter extraordinaire '**Dizzy**'

Gillespie; influential improviser **Thelonious Monk**; jazz singer, dancer, actress and activist **Lena Horne**; and 'the drummer's drummer,' **Buddy Rich**.

With her mesmerising voice and huge stage presence, Ella Fitzgerald was rightfully known globally as The Queen of Jazz. Audiences will be able to see her captured in concert with The Oscar Peterson Trio at the Free Trade Hall in Manchester in *Ella* (ITV, 1964), including classics such as 'Mack the Knife' and 'The Lady is a Tramp.' Also screening is **Omnibus: Ella Fitzgerald at Ronnie Scott's** (BBC, 1974), which saw TV cameras film Fitzgerald in a series of brilliant and intimate concerts at the famous London Jazz Club. Also appearing at the famous club is the incomparable John Birks 'Dizzy' Gillespie in *With Dizzy* Gillespie at Ronnie Scott's Club (BBC, 1975). Rightly remembered as one of the greatest jazz trumpeters of all time, Gillespie and his band also performed on the much-loved BBC jazz series of the 1960s Jazz 625: Dizzy Gillespie (BBC, 1965). Jazz 625 also showcased the work of the brilliant composer and dazzling pianist Thelonious Monk, whose sense of rhythm, space, and harmony made him one of the founders of modern jazz. The season will include Jazz 625: Thelonious Monk (pts 1 & 2) (BBC 1965/66), parts of which feature material restored by the BBC in 1990. 'The drummer's drummer,' Buddy Rich had a self-taught revolutionary style that would go on to influence many generations of great percussionists. A fine selection of clips from Buddy Rich and His Band (BBC, 1974) and Buddy Rich (ITV, 1987) will offer audiences a chance to hear him in conversation with Michael Parkinson and witness him in blistering action. Completing the line-up will be a focus on the incomparable Lena Horne; from dancing at the legendary Cotton Club when she was 16, to conquering Broadway and becoming a Hollywood star, Lena Horne did it all without compromising her core values. Though she became the highest-paid black star in America, she was no stranger to British TV, and a carefully selected compilation of clips will celebrate Horne in both performance and conversation. Although each of these musicians have left their mark on the world of jazz, their prestigious and versatile talent has ensured their names also resonate far beyond the genre.

As part the UK-India Year of Culture, the BFI will embark on a celebration of Indian film throughout the rest of 2017. Co-curated by BFI Head Curator **Robin Baker**, and writer and programmer **Meenakshi Shedde**, the BFI's **INDIA ON FILM** programme, will run at **BFI Southbank**, until **December 2017**.

Running throughout the weekend of **16-17 September, INDIA ON FILM: THIS LAND IS OURS** will be a weekend of screenings and events curated by artist **Tajender Sagoo**, celebrating documentary filmmaker **Sanjay Kak**, who will speak at events throughout the weekend. Urgent and uncompromising, Sanjay Kak has been making documentaries since the mid-1980s and is part of a generation of independent Indian film auteurs who have challenged dominant narratives and who have sought alternative distribution for their work. Kak's films have reached audiences in villages and

small towns across India, distributed and screened through the country's vast network of activist groups.

Three decades after South Asians first came to Britain in the 1960s, Kak's study of the Asian community in the UK, *This Land, My Land, Eng-Land!* (1990), follows a new generation of young creatives, and examines the endless rehearsals that go into the construction of identity. Though made nearly thirty years ago, it speaks to present day Brexit Britain in a profound way. The screening on **Saturday 16 September** will be followed by a **Q&A** with Sanjay Kak and Virinder Kalra, Professor in Sociology, University of Warwick. Also screening on Saturday will be *Jashn-E-Azadi* (2007), which Kak will introduce; about an ongoing conflict in Kashmir, the film centres on the lives of Kashmiri people living in an overwhelmingly militarised society. Screening on **Sunday 17 September** will be *Red Ant Dream* (2013), which Kak will also introduce; in this state-of-the-nation film, the director uses found footage and the rich tradition of poetry and protest songs in an urgent critique of Indian democracy. Completing the weekend will be **Sanjay Kak in Conversation**, a richly illustrated conversation between Kak and Virinder Kalra; the event will see Kak talk about his work as an activist and filmmaker and offer audiences that chance to ask their own questions.
