## The UK box office in 2015

BFI Research and Statistics Unit

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# 1. Key points

- UK cinema admissions in 2015 were 171.9 million, 9% higher than in 2014.
- The gross value of those ticket sales was £1,240 million, up 17% on 2014.
- The highest grossing film released in 2015 was Star Wars: The Force Awakens, with takings of £114 million. This was followed by SPECTRE (£94.7 million) and Jurassic World (£64.5 million).
- Five films earned more than £40 million in 2015 compared with one film in 2014. Sixteen films earned £20 million or more, two more than 2014.
- Legend was the highest-grossing independent UK film of 2015 with takings of £18.4 million and The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel was in second place (£16 million). Eight independent UK films took £5 million or more, up from seven in 2014.
- The market share of independent UK films reached 11%, the third highest in 15 years.

### 2. UK cinema admissions




Figure 1 Annual UK admissions 2001-2015

UK cinema admissions in 2015 were 171.9 million, 9% higher than in 2014 (Figure 1). The gross value of those ticket sales was £1,240 million, up 17% on 2014.

The pattern of monthly cinema admissions is outlined in Table 1.

All months except August had higher admissions in 2015 than in the corresponding month of 2014. The largest increases were in June and November, reflecting the success of Jurassic World, Minions then SPECTRE (a late October release) and The Hunger Games: Mockingjay Part 2.

The higher March and April admissions were partly due to the popularity of Fast & Furious 7 and Avengers: Age of Ultron, both of which topped the box office chart for three weeks.

August 2014 was particularly strong, with several major releases delaying their release until after the FIFA World Cup of that year and August 2015 fell short of the level of ticket sales generated by The Inbetweeners 2 and Guardians of the Galaxy amongst others.

The eagerly anticipated arrival of Star Wars: The Force Awakens, which broke advanced booking records, contributed to an 8% increase in December admissions.

### 3. Top films released in 2015

The following analysis covers films released in the UK and Republic of Ireland in 2015, based on box office data up to and including the 17th January 2016. The highest grossing film released in 2015 was Star Wars: The Force Awakens which, with takings of £114 million, also became the highest grossing film in UK box office history (without adjusting for inflation). This was followed by SPECTRE (£94.7 million) and Jurassic World (£64.5 million). Sixteen films earned £20 million or more, an increase of two titles from 2014.

## 4. Top UK qualifying films released in 2015

The highest-grossing UK qualifying film of 2015 was Star Wars: The Force Awakens (Table 3). In second place was SPECTRE and The Avengers: Age of Ultron (£48.3) million) was third. Fifteen UK qualifying films took £10 million or more in 2015 (up to 17 January 2016), up from seven in 2014.

## 5. Top independent UK films released in 2015

Legend, grossing £18.4 million, was the highest-earning independent UK film of 2015 (Table 4), with The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel in second place. Eight films took £5 million or more, up from seven in 2014.

### 6. Market share of independent UK films

The market share of independent UK films reached 11%, the third highest of the last 15 years but down from 16% in 2014 which was the highest proportion since measurement began in 2001. The market share of US studio backed UK qualifying titles was 34%, the highest since our records began (Table 5). The main contributors to this share were the UK certified titles Star Wars: The Force Awakens, SPECTRE and The Avengers: Age of Ultron.



Figure 2 shows the fluctuating patterns of UK market share with the annual figure dependent on a small number of high-grossing titles. The average UK independent market share for the ten-year period from 2006-2015 was 8.7% with an upward trend from the lowest point of 3% in 2003.

#### **Notes**

#### 1. Data

Admissions data supplied by the Cinema Advertising Association/Rentrak. Gross box office data supplied by Rentrak.

The value of the UK box office in 2015 (£1,240 million) refers to the gross value of UK ticket sales in the calendar year. Subsequent analysis of individual titles and market shares includes box office gross in the UK and Republic of Ireland up to and including 17 January 2016 for films released in the calendar year.

### 2. Definitions

**Country of origin** is allocated by the BFI Research and Statistics Unit. For the purposes of this analysis, **a UK film** is one which is certified as such by the UK Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under Schedule 1 of the Films Act 1985, via the Cultural Test, under one of the UK's official co-production agreements or the European Convention on Cinematographic Coproduction; a film which has not applied for certification but which is obviously British on the basis of its content, producers, finance and talent; or (in the case of a re-release) a film which met the official definition of a British film prevailing at the time it was made or was generally considered to be British at that time. Most UK films in the analysis (including the major UK/USA films) fall into the first group – films officially certified as British.

An **independent film** is produced without creative or financial input from the major US studio companies. These are Fox Entertainment Group, NBC Universal, Paramount Motion Pictures Group, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group and Warner Bros Entertainment.
