The UK box office, first half year (H1) 2017

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1. Key points

- UK cinema admissions in the first six months of 2017 were 84 million, over 6% higher than in 2016
- The highest grossing film released in the first half of 2017 was Beauty and the Beast.
- T2 Trainspotting was the highest earning UK independent release of H1 2017.
- The market share of independent UK films was 8% in the first half of the year.

2. Admissions

Over 84 million cinema tickets were sold in the UK in the first six months of 2017, up over 6% on the same period in 2016 (Table 1). Admissions in January were almost 7% up on January 2016 with the top releases including *La La Land*, *Sing* and December 2016 release *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story*. February admissions were 7% higher than 2016, with the most popular films including *Lego Batman* and *Fifty Shades Darker*. March admissions were up 21% on the same period in 2016 due in most part to the release of the live action version of *Beauty and the Beast*. April was up 19% on 2016, when the latest instalment of the *Fast & Furious* series and *The Boss Baby* were major box office successes. *Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 2* was the highest grossing film in May but overall earnings were 9% down on 2016 and despite *Wonder Woman* earning £20 million, June's admissions fell by 10% as the UK experienced some record breaking summer temperatures.

3. Box Office

In the first six months of 2017, 421 films were released in the UK and Republic of Ireland, with total box office takings of £649 million up to 23 July. The highest grossing release of the half year was *Beauty and the Beast*, which had earned over £72 million to 23 July. In second place was *Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2* (£41 million), followed by *La La Land* (£30 million). The fourth film in the list is *Despicable Me 3* which had grossed over £30 million (Table 2). *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story* earned £14 million in the first quarter of 2017 but does not appear in this table because it is a December 2016 release.

Table 3 shows the top UK independent films of the first six months of 2017. The highest grossing UK independent release was *T2 Trainspotting* which grossed almost £17 million followed by *Baby Driver* with £10.1 million.

4. Market Share

The market share of UK films in the first half of 2017 was 38.5% (Table 3). Of this, the share of UK independent films was 8% and studio-backed films (wholly or part-financed by US studios but featuring UK cast, crew, locations, facilities, post-production and often UK source material) accounted for 30.5%.

2. Definitions

Country of origin is allocated by the BFI Research and Statistics Unit. For the purposes of this analysis, **a UK film** is one which is certified as such by the UK Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under Schedule 1 of the Films Act 1985, via the Cultural Test, under one of the UK's official co-production agreements or the European Convention on Cinematographic Coproduction; a film which has not applied for certification but which is obviously British on the basis of its content, producers, finance and talent; or (in the case of a re-release) a film which met the official definition of a British film prevailing at the time it was made or was generally considered to be British at that time.

An **independent film** is produced without creative or financial input from the major US studio companies. These are Fox Entertainment Group, NBC Universal, Paramount Motion Pictures Group, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group and Warner Bros Entertainment.
