The UK box office, January-September (Q1-Q3) 2017

1. Key points

- UK cinema admissions in the first nine months of 2017 were 127 million, over 1% higher than the same period in 2016.
- The highest grossing film released between Q1-Q3 2017 was *Beauty and the Beast* with takings of over £72 million.
- *T2 Trainspotting* was the highest earning UK independent release of Jan-Sept 2017 with takings of just over £17 million.
- The market share of independent UK films was 8% in the first nine months of the year down from 11% for the same period in 2016.

2. Admissions

Over 127 million cinema tickets were sold in the UK in the first nine months of 2017, more than 1% up on the same period in 2016 (Table 1). In the first four months of 2017 admissions were up compared to the same period in 2016. Admissions in March were up by almost 21% on the previous year, mainly due to the live action release of *Beauty and the Beast*. April was up 19% on 2016, when the latest instalment of the *Fast & Furious* series and *The Boss Baby* were major box office successes.

Admissions were down for May and June compared with 2016. Despite titles such as *Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 2* (£41 million), *Wonder Woman* (£22 million) and *Pirates of the Caribbean: Salazar's Revenge* (19.5 million) being released; record breaking temperatures may have affected cinema going in these months.

July figures were up 7% on 2016 with *Dunkirk* and *Despicable Me 3* performing strongly. Whilst August's and September's figures were down compared to 2016 (August was the highest performing month of 2016 largely due to success of a handful of films including *Finding Dory* and *Bridget Jones's Baby*). During August 2017 *Dunkirk* crossed the £50 million mark and *Despicable Me 3* continued to perform well over the summer holidays. September's release of *It* opened with a weekend box office of over £10 million.

3. Box Office

In the first nine months of 2017, 581 films were released in the UK and Republic of Ireland, with total box office takings of £966 million up to 19 October. The highest grossing release of the year so far is *Beauty and the Beast*, which had earned over £72 million to 19 October (Table 2). In second place was *Dunkirk* (£56 million), followed by *Despicable Me 3* (£47 million). The fourth film in the list is *Guardians of the Galaxy Volume 2. It*, placing fifth, has taken nearly £32 million and has become the highest ever grossing horror film in the UK. *Rogue One: A Star Wars Story* earned £14 million in the first quarter of 2017 but does not appear in this table because it is a December 2016 release.

Table 3 shows the top UK independent films of the first nine months of 2017. The highest grossing UK independent release was *T2 Trainspotting* which grossed over £17 million followed by *Baby Driver* with £13 million. In third place was *Victoria and Abdul* which achieved a box office of £9 million since its release in September.

4. Market Share

The market share of UK films released between January and September 2017 was 37%, up from 30% for the same period in 2016. Of this, the share of UK independent films was 8% (down from 11% in Q1-Q3 2016) and studio-backed films (wholly or part-financed by US studios but featuring UK cast, crew, locations, facilities, post-production and often UK source material) accounted for 29% (up from 19% in Q1-Q3 2016).

1. Data

Analysis of individual titles and market shares includes box office gross in the UK and Republic of Ireland up to and including 19 October 2017 for films released in the calendar year between 1 January and 30 September 2017.

2. Definitions

Country of origin is allocated by the BFI Research and Statistics Unit. For the purposes of this analysis, **a UK film** is one which is certified as such by the UK Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under Schedule 1 of the Films Act 1985, via the Cultural Test, under one of the UK's official co-production agreements or the European Convention on Cinematographic Coproduction; a film which has not applied for certification but which is obviously British on the basis of its content, producers, finance and talent; or (in the case of a re-release) a film which met the official definition of a British film prevailing at the time it was made or was generally considered to be British at that time.

An **independent film** is produced without creative or financial input from the major US studio companies. These are Fox Entertainment Group, NBC Universal, Paramount Motion Pictures Group, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group and Warner Bros Entertainment.

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
